Who has been your best neighbor? Worst neighbor?

You know the story of "The Good Samaritan," but read it again. It's really good. Luke 10:25-37

What words, phrases, images, in the story stand out to you?

What questions are asked in the story?

Are you surprised with any of the answers to the questions? Which ones?

According to Leviticus 19:18, how would the religious scholar define "neighbor"?

How did the Samaritan fit into that definition?

Think of the divisiveness in the U.S. today between groups. Multiply that 10 times and you get the feeling between the Samaritans and the Jews.

Why, then, would Jesus make a Samaritan the hero of a story he was telling to a Jewish audience?

Jesus was telling an expert in Moses' Law that he could learn spiritual lessons from someone of a different religion!!

What does that tell us about our openness to other religions?

Jesus expanded "neighbor" from "my tribe" to "all people." How is "All men are created equal" similar to the "neighbor" situation in this story?

Monday, January 20 is MLK Jr Day. Dr. King said the Declaration of Independence was a "promissory note...a promise that all men, yes, black men as well as white, men would be guaranteed unalienable rights."

How can we better expand the "Declaration's" statement to include all people? How can we better see everyone as our neighbor? (Colossians 1:17; 1 Peter 3:8)

Jesus tells the religious scholar to "Go and do the same," to "follow the example" of someone who was his religious and cultural enemy. Radical indeed.

Think about this: Jesus never tells us to do something without giving us the power to do it (Philippians 4:13).
